Here are a few ways to be responsible online –

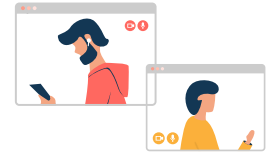
- Avoid posting information online that could reveal details about yourself. Protect your personal information like addresses or phone numbers, and be cautious about sharing sensitive details on public

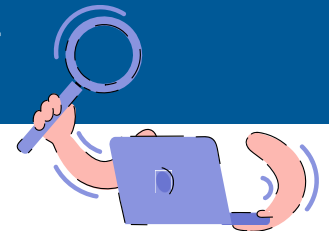
Being responsible online means considering the consequences of what you share, post, or comment. It means being mindful of your digital footprint to protect your personal information.

COLLABORATION:

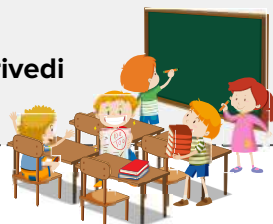
Working in groups can help develop communication and management skills, thereby facilitating teamwork which develops trust amongst peers.

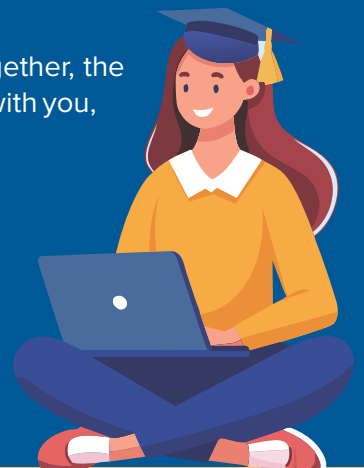
